

# SUPPORT PROGRAMS

*keep students on track for  
success*

Citrus College offers dozens of programs across campus designed to meet the unique needs of our students.

By hosting a variety of events and offering specialized assistance, these programs found even more ways to make students feel supported during the 2024-2025 academic year.

The basic needs program provided students with access to food, toiletries and technology. In addition to operating a year-round food pantry in the Campus Center, the program worked with the Los Angeles Regional Food Bank to host a monthly mobile food pantry for students and community members to pick up fresh food items.

Elsewhere on campus, the Dream Resource Center played an important role in helping undocumented and other immigration-impacted students. Throughout the year, staff connected students with various resources and hosted several social events and lunches to bring campus community members together.

In the Veterans Success Center, the incredible team, led by director Maria Buffo, continued to serve student-veterans and help them achieve their academic, personal and professional goals.

In November, Citrus College partnered with Azusa Pacific University for the 19th annual Saluting Our Veterans ceremony. The event's honorees included

Citrus College employee Allan Weaver, an instructional lab technician II in the college's automotive technology department who served in the U.S. Army. Citrus College alumnus and U.S. Army veteran Jixing Bian delivered the keynote address.

During the 2024-2025 academic year, many other programs offered support to students, including foster care and kinship education, Black Scholars and the Pride Center.

For example, the Pride Center provided the campus community with access to resources and LGBTQIA+ ally trainings, as well as programs and workshops tailored for queer students.

Black Scholars organized study halls and other activities designed to promote community and academic success. The group also organized a trip to the annual A2MEND African American Male Summit, which brought together students and educators to increase the success of male Black students in the community college system.

"These specialized programs and services made a tremendous difference in the lives of our students," said Superintendent/President Schulz. "It is gratifying to witness how much our faculty and staff care about helping our students succeed."

# Governing board **INSTALLS THREE** *trustees*

Two newly elected trustees and one reelected trustee were sworn in during the annual organizational meeting of the Citrus Community College District Board of Trustees in December 2024. Steven Bluitt Flowers and Randa B. Wahbe, Ed.D., took their oaths of office, while Laura J. Bollinger retained her seat after being elected to serve a second term.

Trustee Bluitt Flowers ran unopposed in the November 2024 election and assumed the position previously held by Patricia A. Rasmussen, Ed.D., who retired at the end of her term. He is the representative for trustee area 4, which encompasses Glendora and portions of San Dimas.

A lifelong advocate for public service, Trustee Bluitt Flowers has held a variety of leadership roles. As a Citrus College student, he served as both a senator and legislative liaison for the Associated Students of Citrus College. Prior to being elected, Bluitt Flowers was president of the Citrus Alumni & Friends Association and a member of the Citrus College Foundation Board of Directors. Additional community involvement has included service on the Glendora Public Library Board of Trustees and the Glendora Community Coordinating Council.

Trustee Wahbe was also elected to the board of trustees in November 2024 and assumes the position previously held by Mary Ann Lutz, who retired at the end of her term. She represents trustee area 5, which serves Monrovia, Bradbury and portions of Duarte.

A San Gabriel Valley native, Dr. Wahbe has more than 25 years of experience in community college education. She began her career as an adjunct English instructor at Citrus College, Fullerton College, Glendale Community College and Pasadena City College before securing a full-time, tenured faculty position at Cypress College in the North Orange County Community College District.

Trustee Bollinger, who ran unopposed, represents trustee area 2, which includes Claremont and portions of Pomona and La Verne. A Claremont resident for more than 30 years, she has participated in numerous community organizations and has held many leadership roles. Bollinger's local involvement includes time spent with the Claremont Community Foundation; Claremont Heritage; Friends of Claremont Library; and two organizations that serve the Claremont Colleges. She also serves as a member of the Fairplex Association and the Los Angeles County Library Foundation, reflecting a long record of civic involvement across the San Gabriel Valley.

# SCHOLAR-ATHLETES

*excel in*

Across all 16 sports, the Fighting Owls enjoyed immense success during the 2024-2025 academic year.

From earning multiple postseason appearances to setting new school records, Citrus College student-athletes proved that it's possible to achieve at a high level, both on and off the field.

In a year filled with highlights, one of the most remarkable moments occurred in May 2025 when swimmer Kori Cunningham set three school records while competing at the 76th annual Swim and Dive Championships in Santa Rosa. A few weeks later, she took home Female Athlete of the Year honors at the 62nd annual Achievement Awards.

On the softball diamond, the women's team earned its second consecutive postseason appearance after winning the Western State Conference-South title. Though the Fighting Owls lost in the first round, the team put up an incredible fight. Additionally, several players earned individual Western State Conference-South honors, including Madelyn Hajj, who took home conference MVP.

The men's and women's basketball teams had spectacular seasons. The men's team appeared in the 3C2A State Championship semifinals and finished the season a record of



# competition *and* academics

29-3, setting a record for most wins in a season since 2008. Standouts KJ Perry and Tyler Isaak earned All-State Men's Basketball Team honors.

The women's basketball team also made a playoff run. Though the team lost in the first round of the 3C2A SoCal Regional, they finished with an impressive 18-11 overall record. Jolleen Olia, who later transferred to Cal Poly Pomona, broke the Citrus College women's basketball record for most career points with 1,053.

On the pitch, women's soccer made the playoffs after finishing with an impressive 14-4-2 record. After the season, seven players earned all-conference honors.

In the spring, Citrus College broke the record for most Scholar Ballers in a single year when 162 student-athletes maintained a GPA of at least 3.0. To mark the occasion, honorees were recognized in a pregame ceremony and treated to a meal from Raising Cane's.

"On behalf of the entire campus community, I want to commend our scholar-athletes for their outstanding accomplishments," said Superintendent/president Schulz. "It has been an honor to watch this entire group succeed at the highest level."

Monumental moments like these are exactly what Citrus College's acclaimed performing arts programs are all about.

Dedicated to helping students refine their craft and prepare for professional careers, each program provides the training and education necessary to succeed in the entertainment industry. Throughout the year, numerous production and performance opportunities enabled students to increase their confidence and showcase their talent.

One such opportunity took place in spring 2025, when the Citrus Singers participated in a 10-day tour of Italy. Performing their classical repertoire at remarkable venues throughout the country, the group captivated audiences and left a lasting impression on the communities they visited.

Another performance highlight was the October 2024 musical theatre workshop presentation of "Carrie: The Musical," a contemporary rock opera that is a stage adaptation of Stephen King's bestselling novel.

Several months later, the Haugh Performing Arts Center was home to the February 2025 production of "Rent." Directed by faculty member Renee Liskey with vocal direction from faculty member Marius Beltran, the production showcased the students' exceptional talent and received rave reviews.

The theatre arts program presented several outstanding productions of their own last year. In April, "The School of Lies," a wild farce adapted from Moliere's "The Misanthrope," was performed in the Little Theatre. The program was also proud to present Citrus Theatreworks 2025 in the Little Theatre. Titled, "An Afternoon of Scenes from

Award-Winning Plays," it was directed and acted entirely by students. The show featured scenes from "The Odd Couple," "The Shadow Box," "The Pillowman," "Angels in America" and more.

The 2025 Festival of Concert Bands, held in February, was another standout event. Hosted by the Citrus College Sierra Wind Symphony, the festival featured ensembles from local high schools as well as Azusa Pacific University. And, as always, the annual "Christmas Is..." holiday show delighted audiences and proved to be an audience favorite.

As the 2024-2025 academic year shows, being part of a Citrus College performing arts group provides students with a diverse array of performance experiences. These opportunities allow students to gain real-world experience, while exemplifying the college's commitment to nurturing artistic excellence.

TRIO STEM is leading the charge of preparing Citrus College students for careers in STEM and health sciences fields.

With its home in the Center for Innovation Building, the TRIO STEM program assists students who are first-generation, low-income or registered with the college's Disabled Student Programs and Services program. Staff provide students with opportunities for academic development and help them navigate college requirements, in addition to offering personalized STEM subject tutoring.

"I enjoy seeing students who completely change their attitude toward higher education due to the support they receive in our program," said Karina Quevedo, senior TRIO STEM facilitator.

TRIO STEM students also have access to multiple workshops, with topics ranging from financial aid to professional development.

As of March 2025, nearly two dozen majors and programs are eligible to participate in TRIO STEM. Currently, the program supports almost 100 students.

The Citrus College Nursing program has long been dedicated to meeting the evolving needs of its students.

During the 2024-2025 academic year, the program gained more visibility when Citrus College partnered with Azusa Pacific University (APU) to increase access to nursing education.

Through the collaboration, nursing students can concurrently enroll at both institutions, earning credits and clinical experience. After only six semesters, students can earn their Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) degree from APU.

By working together, both institutions are doing their part to make students highly employable, given that California health care organizations prefer to hire BSN-prepared graduates. They are also giving students an efficient and cost-effective pathway to earn their nursing degrees.

Another major highlight for the nursing program came when it began incorporating virtual reality into its curriculum. Dr. Salima Allahbachayo, director of health sciences at Citrus College, said the immersive learning experience provides students with realistic practice opportunities in a safe environment.

# **STREAMLINING** **transfer pathways** *with* **ASU**

During the 2024-2025 academic year, Citrus College teamed up with Arizona State University (ASU) to offer students a seamless transfer experience through the MyPath2ASU program.

Thanks to the partnership, Citrus College students have a clear and welcoming path to transfer to ASU. Students receive personalized guidance through more than 400 course-by-course guided pathways to ASU online and in-person degree programs.

The agreement between both institutions also provides Citrus College students with a guaranteed general admission to ASU and admission into a MyPath2ASU major choice if all requirements are met.

"Citrus College is thrilled to partner with ASU to make it easier for our students to get guaranteed admission to one of the nation's leading educational institutions," said Superintendent/President Schulz.

# *Distinguished Alumni* *Award:* **LUCY CODE**



Lucy Code, a passionate educator, freelance graphic artist and devoted volunteer, is one of two recipients of the 2025 Citrus College Distinguished Alumni Award.

Code grew up in San Pedro, California, and relocated to La Puente at age 15. She graduated from La Puente High School in 1983 and enrolled at Azusa Pacific University (APU) as an art major the following fall. "Mr. Bob Bullock, who was my art professor at APU, also taught at Citrus College," she remembered. "He had a lasting impact on me, for which I am deeply grateful."

In 1986, Code transferred to ArtCenter College of Design in Pasadena. However, her scholarship and financial aid eligibility came to an end and, without the resources to continue, she needed to take a leave from her studies. Soon after, Code enrolled in a watercolor summer workshop offered through the Citrus College Noncredit program.

In the early 1990s, Code returned to Citrus College as a credit student. "The affordable, student-centered environment gave me the flexibility to complete my general education requirements while managing my family responsibilities," she said. With the support of the college's counselors, she successfully transferred back to APU and completed her bachelor's degree in 1993.

After graduating, Code was hired as the administrative assistant in APU's Department of Art. Through the university's employee tuition reimbursement program, she continued her schooling and earned a Master's Degree in Educational Technology in 1999, as well as multiple teaching credentials.

With her academic foundation solidified, Code embarked on a career in education. She taught a variety of classes as an adjunct faculty member at Citrus College and APU. Seeking to add additional units to her teaching credential, Code enrolled at Citrus College once again. She would go on to earn two associate degrees in 2011 – one in social sciences and another in fine arts.

A strong believer in community and lifelong learning, Code spends her free time volunteering with the Citrus Alumni & Friends Association, most recently serving as president. She enjoys spending time with her family, and she is proud that both of her children are Citrus College alumni.

# *Distinguished Alumni* Award: **REGINA DE DOELDER**



Regina de Doelder, an acclaimed performer, accomplished professional and dedicated member of the community, is one of two recipients of the 2025 Citrus College Distinguished Alumni Award.

A longtime resident of the San Gabriel Valley, de Doelder moved with her family to Glendora in 1955, where she became an active member of the Glendora Nazarene Church choir. She furthered her love of singing by enrolling at Citrus Union High School and auditioning for a USO show organized by Bob Hope. She earned a spot on the tour, which took her to military bases and ships across all branches of the armed forces.

After three years at Citrus Union High School, de Doelder transferred to the newly opened Glendora High School. She played an integral role in shaping school spirit, working alongside classmates to write the school song and select the school colors. In 1960, de Doelder proudly joined 187 of her fellow students as the first Glendora High School class to graduate on the school's new campus.

After high school, de Doelder enrolled at Citrus College and continued to immerse herself in vocal music. Her hard work paid off and, in 1961, she transferred from Citrus College to Pasadena College (now Point Loma Nazarene University), thanks to a prestigious vocal scholarship.

De Doelder embarked on her career in 1963, working as a receptionist for Aerojet in Azusa. She later became a courier and was entrusted with handling sensitive hardware and documents. During her 29 years at Aerojet, de Doelder was involved in many memorable moments, including transporting classified information about rocket engines for the Apollo program.

Following her retirement in 1992, de Doelder dedicated herself to giving back to her community. She became a volunteer at the La Fetra Center, spending the past 34 years serving senior citizens in Glendora. Her dedication has been recognized with several honors, including the Glendora Humanitarian Service Award and the Ruth Harper Award.

An avid traveler, de Doelder and her husband of 62 years spent many trips abroad. She has visited 182 countries, including all the continents, oceans, seas and major rivers of the world, except the Ganges in India.

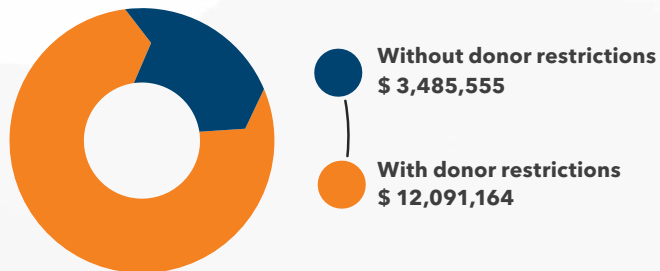
